Foreword

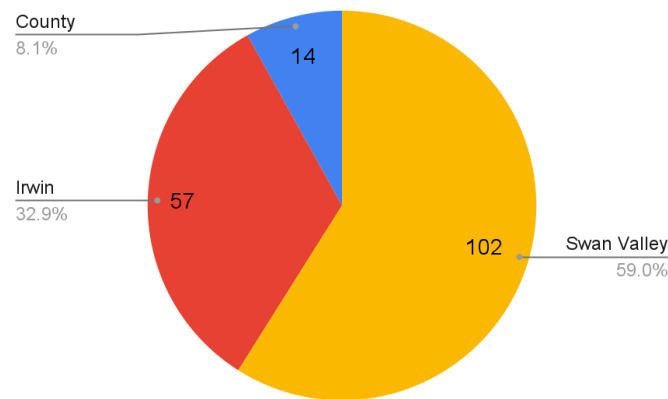
Dear Residents,

Survey Submission by Area

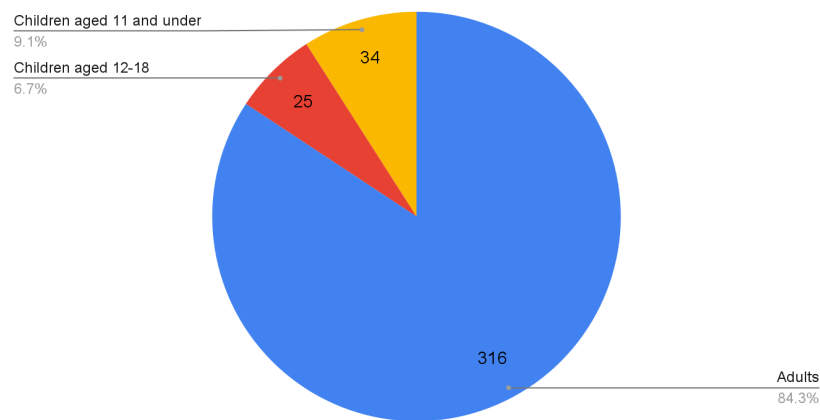


Swan Valley residents make up 102 out of 173 total submitted surveys.

Children aged 11 and under make up 34 out of 375 total individuals represented in the survey.

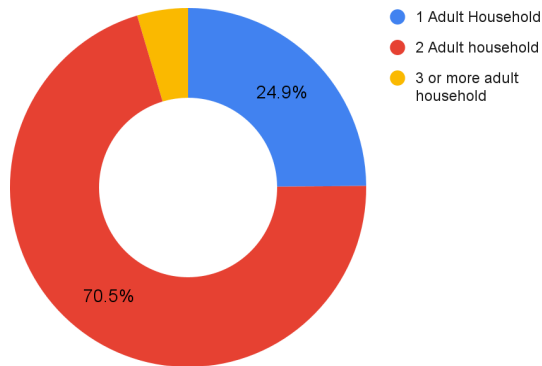
Children aged 12-18 make up 25 out of 375 total individuals represented in the survey.

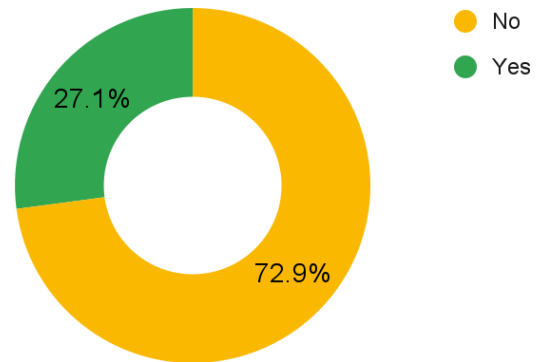
A total of 173 surveys from Swan Valley, Irwin and County Address residents were submitted.

1. Adults per household



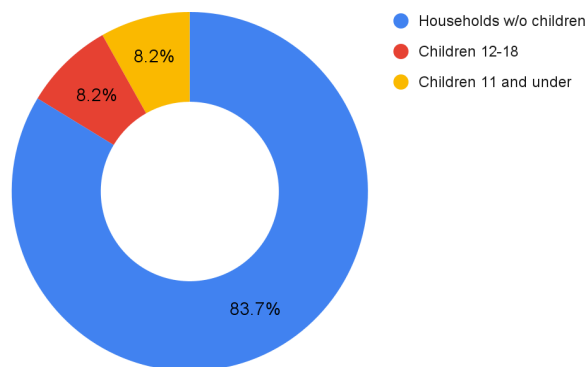
43 out of 173 respondents are the only adult in the household

3. Ancestors who lived in the Valley



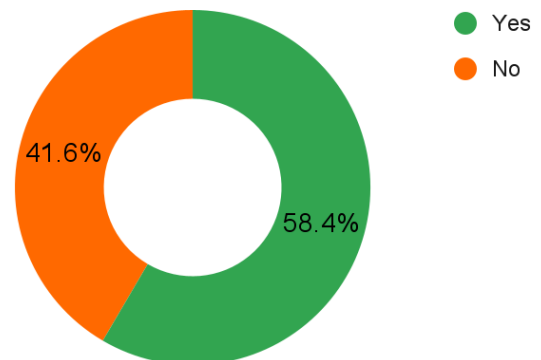
45 out of 173 respondents have ancestors who lived in the valley

2. Children the age of 12-18, and 11 and under



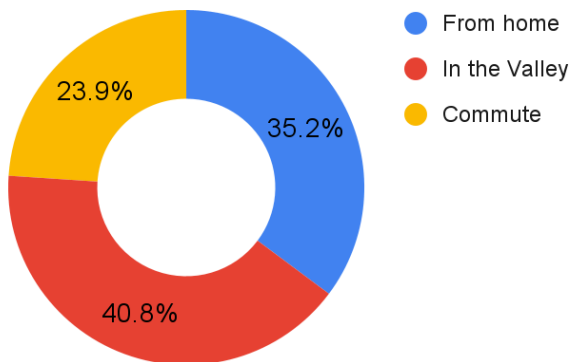
16 out of 173 respondents have children 11 and under

4. Retired vs Non-retired



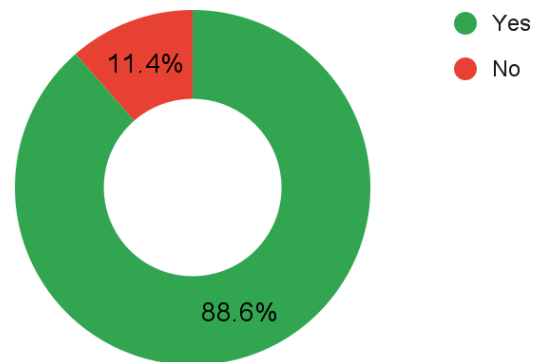

5. If not retired, which of the following is most true in regards to where you work?



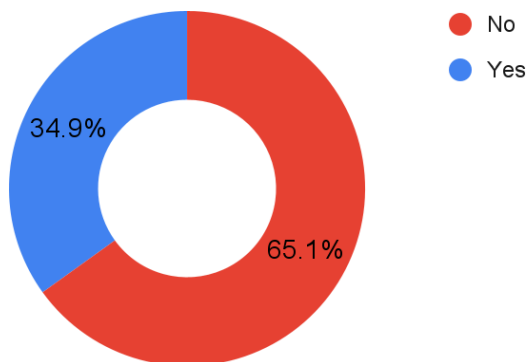
30 out of 75 workers work in the valley

7. Do you intend to stay in the valley for the rest of your life?



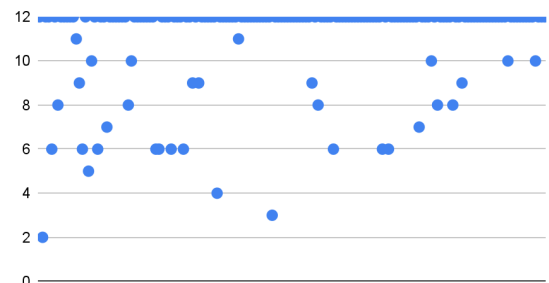
154 out of 173 respondents intend to stay in the valley for the rest of their life.

8. Average amount of months spent in the valley per year

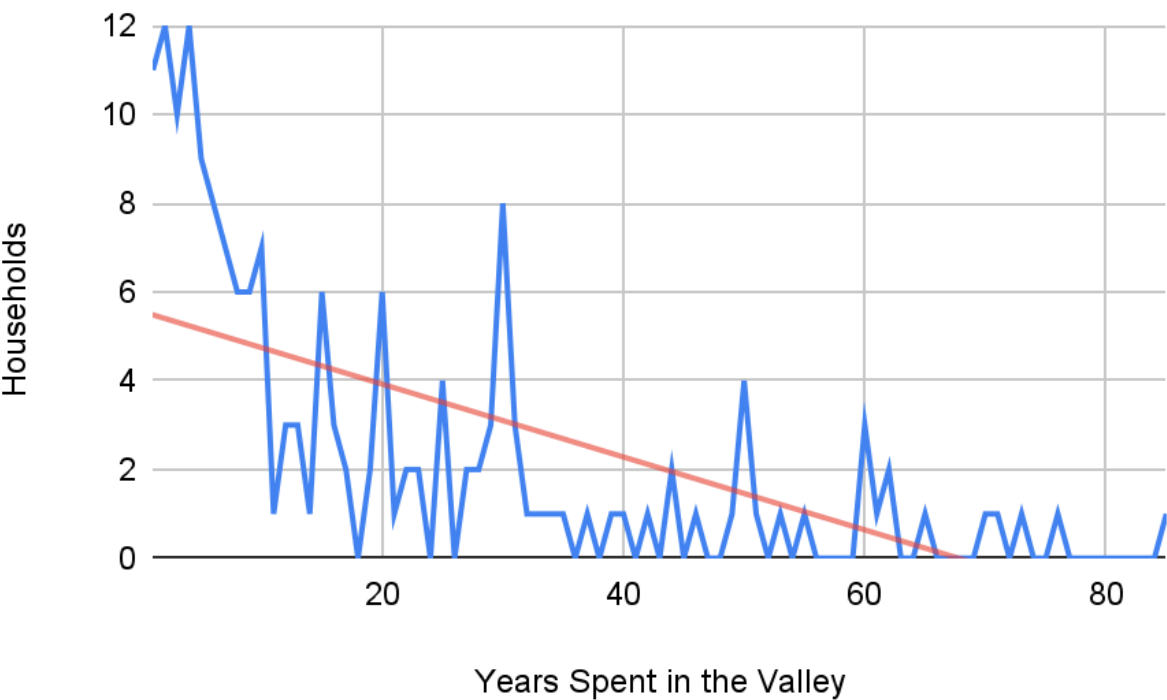


On average, how many months of the year do you spend in the valley?

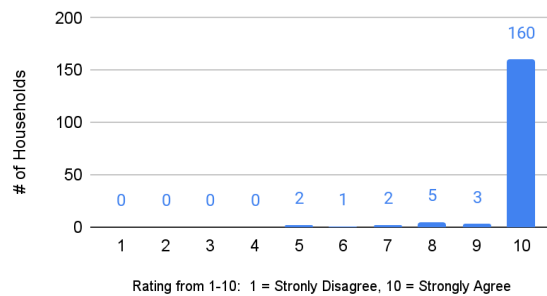

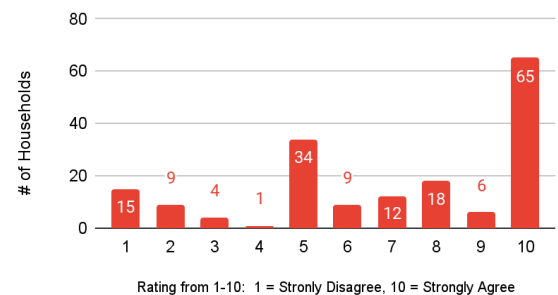

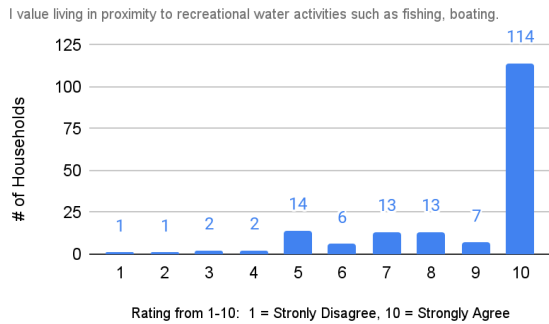


13. I value overnight recreation such as camping (tent, camper, RV)

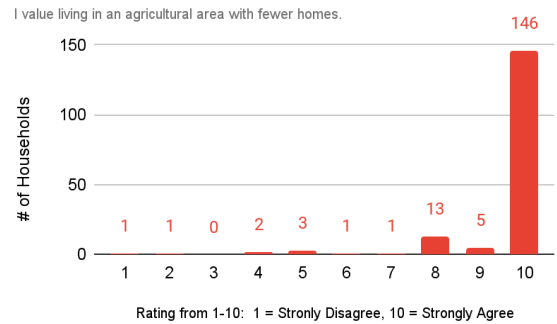
